Challenge Course

Located in the 27-acre forest beside Trinity Western University's main campus, the Challenge Course takes people away from the business of life while still providing access to the University's modern campus amenities. It is the perfect setting to challenge one's social, mental, and physical dexterity. TWU's trained professionals guide men and women (it is open to the public) through activities on the course, consisting of low and high elevation elements and experiential games. While groups form a "safety net" below, participants challenge themselves by working together and balancing on cables a few feet off the ground. High elements involve activities 30 to 75 feet high using a harness and rope system. Participants always have the choice of how much of the challenge they wish to accept.

Communication, leadership, teamwork, trust, and fear are integral parts of daily life. One's ability to reach his or her goals and make a difference depends on how well he or she handles each life skill. The Trinity Western University Challenge Course offers a dynamic learning approach to help people acquire effective skills they won't learn in the classroom. It's an approach we customize to meet an organization's particular needs. Personal experience is the best teacher! The TWU Challenge Course uses hands-on, character-testing activities that build awareness of one's strengths and limitations and help people move beyond them. As a result, people increase their self-confidence and better prepare themselves for risk-taking, problem-solving, and life skill development.

Students have the opportunity to experience the Challenge Course through their student leadership positions or as a group. They can also work as facilitators for the Challenge Course.

Dining Services

All students, faculty, staff, and guests are welcome at all campus food outlets. The main dining room is located in the Reimer Student Centre. The Douglas Centre's food outlet is the Lower Caf, which provides snacks and lighter fare. All resident students living in dorm-style housing have access to the Reimer Student Centre Dining Room and Lower Caf through their meal plan or cash. Commuters and those not living in dorm-style housing may purchase a meal plan through Enrolment Services or pay cash.

Meal Plan

The Meal Plan is accessed conveniently through the student ID card. The Meal Plan is the board portion of the semester room and board fee for living on campus. The ID card is activated with the predetermined value at the beginning of each academic semester and can be used at all dining facilities within the University. Every time the ID card is used, the choice value is deducted from the total semester value in the individual's food account. The entire value amount must be used during the semester of purchase, with roll-over privileges from the fall to spring semester, provided that dorm residency is continued. A statement of account transactions is supplied three times per semester.

Purchasing this Meal Plan means eating "à la carte," offering students the opportunity to eat what they wish, when they wish, and where they want to eat on campus. The Canadian government has made a provision for the University to provide the Residence Meal Plan value free of Goods and Services Tax, which is a savings of seven per cent on each transaction. Ecosystem Study Area

Encompassing all undeveloped natural areas of the Trinity Western University main campus, as well as 57 acres across Glover Road, the Ecosystem Study Area (ESA) is a beautiful example of God's creation, providing areas for recreation, relaxation, and outdoor education. While specific university course work and research projects make use of virtually all of the 85+ acres, the two main trail loops—one through the best woodlands of the ESA and one through the front pond and Salmon River area—are the primary areas open to the campus community and public.

The purpose of the Ecosystem Study Area is threefold: 1) to serve as an area open to all for recreation and appreciation of nature; 2) to serve as a living "outdoor laboratory" for university course work and public education; and 3) to serve as a creation stewardship site for protection of plant and wildlife species.

Hundreds of species, including a number of rare and endangered species, have been catalogued in the ESA and ongoing research efforts add to this total. Splendid examples of mature Pacific Northwest temperate rainforest species exist in some portions of the ESA, with highly productive salmon-bearing streams throughout. While of obvious value to Biology, Environmental Studies, and other science departments, the ESA is also of interest to non-science departments as an historic area, a fitness course, and an inspirational area for literary and fine arts students.

In the interest of serving the multiple uses of the ESA, certain areas have been set aside for general public use, while other areas are left in a completely natural state, accessed for research of special projects only by permission from the campus Ecological Stewardship Committee. It is intended that this division of public and restricted areas strikes a balance between heavy impact use and conservation/education use. To that end, the following set of rules has been developed for the Ecosystem Study Area:

- Stay on designated trails
- Leave all vegetation and animals in place
- No motorized vehicles, bicycles, horseback riding, or pets

A group of volunteer stewards conducts patrols, research projects, and maintenance projects in the ESA throughout the year. Parcels and Customs Issues

Due to Canada Customs regulations, TWU is not allowed to bring parcels and magazines across the U.S. border. Therefore, parcels and magazines from the U.S. must be addressed to the student's Canadian address (listed above).

To reduce problems in receiving parcels from the U.S., parcels should be sent via the U.S. Postal Service to the Langley address. A Customs declaration (available at any U.S. post office) must be affixed to the parcel. Gifts of a \$60 (Cdn) value or less are duty and GST free.

Note: Parcels sent via courier will be subject to brokerage charges and may be subject to duty and GST depending on value.

Norma Marion Alloway Library

The Norma Marion Alloway Library plays a key role in students' educational experience. It serves as an extension of the classroom by providing resources and services for research projects, term papers, presentations, and personal growth.

The Library, providing nearly 39,000 square feet of floor space, is located near the centre of campus. It seats more than 350 students and houses a collection of more than 190,000 print volumes and houses an additional 49,000 microform volume equivalents.

The Library provides a variety of resources, including books, periodicals, documents, microfilms, audio-visual materials, and curriculum materials centre. University Archives and Special Collections, also housed in the Library, are available for research. Students and faculty also have electronic access to full text data bases, indexes, reference sources, and catalogues of other libraries. To help students make more effective use of its collections, the Library provides the following facilities and services: research assistance, bibliographic instruction, interlibrary loans, 30 public computers, access to the Internet, electronic databases, listening/viewing stations, photocopiers, and individual/group study rooms.

COPPUL membership allows graduate and undergraduate students borrowing privileges at most Canadian university libraries. Other libraries in the Lower Mainland such as Regent College, Columbia Bible College, and Summit Pacific College have reciprocal borrowing privileges. The Norma Marion Alloway Library is open to the public for on-site use. Arrangements can be made for external borrowing privileges.

The University Archives are located on the upper level of the Norma Marion Alloway Library. The mandate of the University Archives is to preserve and provide access to the unique

institutional history of the University. To this end, the Archives acquires, organizes, and preserves archival materials which document the mission, characteristics, decisions, and activities of the TWU community. At present, the Archives' holdings consist of approximately 80 metres of paper records and 8,000 photographs, as well as video and audio cassettes and several artifacts.

The archivist also selects materials of archival value accumulated by individuals and corporate bodies whose relationship to the University is significant. The Robert N. Thompson Collection and Mel Smith Papers are two such collections.

Technology Services

By fall 2004, the University will be a wireless community with 802.11b/g wireless network connectivity. The cost for this service is included in student residence fees; however, commuter students and non-resident users will pay a nominal fee (for details, see www.ucs.twu.ca/wireless). Students living on campus may also connect their personal computers via ethernet cable. All wireless and cable connections connect to the University's 10 Mb internet feed. For students without a personal computer or for students who live off campus, computer labs are available to check email.

All students, upon arrival, are issued a username and password for access to the student network, computer labs, and their e-mail account. A student's username and password are to be kept secure at all times. It is the sole responsibility of the student to ensure that his or her password is not given to others. Misuse of computing resources will be reported to Student Life for disciplinary action. Students must read and agree to the University's acceptable use policy at www.ucs.twu.ca/aup.html.

Technology Services will assist students if they need or lose their e-mail password, or if they suspect a bad network connection in their residence. Students can come to the Technology Services Help Desk in the Mattson Centre, Lower Floor. For security reasons, students are required to present their student ID card or valid pictured driver's licence to obtain their e-mail and logon credentials.

Personal Computers in Residence Rooms

Students may bring any type of computer with any available operating system. However, Computing Services recommends a minimum operating system of Microsoft Windows 2000 and Microsoft Office 2000 or Mac OS 8.0 and up with MacOffice. This will allow for the best compatibility with TWU systems. To connect a computer in resident rooms, students must have a 10/100baseT network card and provide an Ethernet RJ45 patch cable (minimum 6 ft.). These are available at any electronics store. New PCs may have a network card installed. For wireless, students need an 802.11b adapter card. Many notebooks have 802.11b wireless built in.

Personal Computer Troubles

For resolving computer troubles, students can contact the help ministry called SHOUT. This student volunteer group can verify room connections and help with many computer issues. For more serious computer troubles, students may need to contact their computer manufacturer for support. SHOUT volunteers can be reached by calling 604.888.7511 ext. 3777 or by visiting them in Douglas Centre.

Computer Labs

**Main Drop-in Lab,
Neufeld Science Centre**

This lab is equipped with 30 Pentium machines running Windows NT 4.0 workstation and ten PowerPC Macintoshes with MacOS 8 offering the

Microsoft Office suite of programs as well as various other class-specific programs.

**Geography Lab,
Robert N. Thompson Building**

The Geography Computer Lab is used by (authorized) Geography majors and minors to undertake Geography projects that require specialized spatial information software. This type of software is referred to as Geographic Information Systems (GIS). Arc/Info and IDRISI are the two GIS programs on every computer in the lab. There are also other programs, such as Excel, SPSS, Paint, and Word, which are integrated into lab assignments and projects. Internet access for project research is also available. The courses which are serviced by this lab on an unrestricted basis are GIS, Cartography, and Quantitative Methods for Geography. On a controlled access basis, the courses are GEOG 101 and 102 (Introduction to Geography), Urban Environments, Economic Geography, and Field Methods.

The ten Pentium Windows 2000 workstations are equipped with a digitizing tablet and puck for GIS data input. Each station is also networked to a HP4V printer and a HP650C colour plotter for cartographic output.

**Instructional Lab,
Neufeld Science Centre**

An interactive classroom consisting of 25 Windows NT 4.0 workstations where live demonstrations by professors are given to students while the students learn hands on.

Writing Centre Lab, Douglas Centre

A series of word processing workstations for the preparation of papers with faculty members, who are available for consultation. (See also Writing Centre in this section.)

**Multimedia Lab,
Vernon Strombeck Centre**

A video editing workstation running Adobe Premiere for creating multimedia presentations. Business Computing Lab, Northwest Building
This workstation can be used by Business students to research and create presentations.

**Senior Computing Lab,
Neufeld Science Centre**

Four NT and three PPC workstations with better hardware and more software than the main drop-in lab. Reserved for fourth year Computing Science students to complete programming projects and experiment with various platforms and applications.

**Graduate Computing Lab,
Northwest Building**

Reserved for graduate students to do research and/or type papers. Uses SPSS for statistical analysis, etc.

The Front Desk (Housing)

The Front Desk wants to contribute to a living and learning environment that promotes individual growth and development, encourages the development of godly Christian leaders, and provides well maintained, safe, secure, comfortable, and affordable housing for full-time students.

Most dormitory rooms house two students and are supplied with beds, mattresses, and other essential furnishings. No cooking equipment is allowed in the dormitory rooms. Students are expected to provide their own linens, towels, etc. Each residence building contains coin-operated laundry facilities.

Robson Hall provides third and fourth year full-time students with the option of living in a dorm-style environment, but with the facilities to prepare their own meals. It joins Fraser and Douglas Halls, the main women's and men's residence buildings, in providing a variety of dormitory styles to suit the various needs and demands of full-time students. Selected third and fourth year students also have the opportunity to live in fully independent apartments. These apartments are located in several buildings on campus including Fraser, McMillan, and Northwest.

Housing Policies

Accepted full-time students will receive a Residence Application which must be completed and returned to the Admissions Office with a \$200 deposit to reserve a bed. All applications for student housing should be made as soon as possible after acceptance to the University. Priority for housing is given to those who submit a housing application and deposit first.

All full-time students under 21 years of age or who have not attained third year status (57 sem. hrs.) are required to live in residence unless living

with their parents or legal guardian. Those students who, due to extenuating circumstances, desire to live off campus, but not with their parents, must appeal for special permission by submitting a written request to the Housing Appeals Committee no later than June 15 for the fall semester and October 15 for the spring semester. Appeals are to be filed at The Front Desk.

Specified hours have been established for co-ed visitation. Additional residential housing details are included in the Student Handbook, which is provided to students upon arrival.

Trinity Western University Student Association

The Trinity Western University Student Association is the official organization of the students at Trinity Western University. The Association is comprised of every student enrolled in the undergraduate program who pays student fees. It is governed by the Student Council. Council is the representative voice of the Association and is responsible for its daily operations and business.

The mission of the Trinity Western University Student Association (TWUSA) is to promote a maturing and active commitment to Jesus Christ amongst association members; to challenge one another spiritually, socially, and intellectually; to provide individuals with opportunities for involvement; and to impact positively the life of the University as well as the community at large.

Student Council is made up of seven executive members, 10 representatives, and 15 appointed positions. The Association elects 15 members to the Student Council, 14 of whom are elected in early spring to take office in April. The 15th elected member, the Freshman Class Representative, is elected in September.

The Student Council Executive is composed of the President, Executive Vice-President, Vice-President of Finance, Vice-President of Student Relations, Vice-President of Academic Affairs, Executive Director of Events, and Executive Assistant. Each member of the Executive is responsible for a separate team of non-Executive Council members.

The Executive Vice-President serves as chair of the Student Council business meetings, and the Executive Assistant is responsible for the minutes of all Student Council meetings. The Executive Director of Events is responsible for all Association events. The 16 voting members on Student Council are the Executive, the Senior, Junior, Sophomore, and Freshman class representatives, and the six representatives from each of the faculties: Humanities and Social Sciences, Natural and Applied Sciences, Professional Studies and

Performing Arts, the School of Business, the School of Education, and the School of Human Kinetics.

The Student Council includes 15 appointed positions; each plays a specific role in the Council's day-to-day operations. The positions, which are appointed by the Executive, are as follows: Associate Director of Communications, Associate Director of Operations, Ground Level Coordinator, Audio Visual Technician, two Events Assistants, Research Coordinator, Administrative Assistant, and Website Developer. The Student Council Executive, along with the University administration, appoints the Editors-in-Chief of the Mars' Hill (student newspaper), Pillar (student yearbook), and the Video Yearbook.

New students are encouraged to run for Freshman Class Representative, or to apply for one of the several appointed positions that are intentionally left vacant for first year students to fill in the fall. As well, the Student Association has opportunities for involvement with its media departments (Mars' Hill ,Pillar yearbook, and the Video Yearbook).

The Council advocates for student concerns to the University administration, conducts surveys and hosts forums on current campus issues, and communicates information on administrative decisions to the student body. The President presents students' concerns to Cabinet Forum, and the Vice-President of Academic Relations does likewise to the Undergraduate Academic Council. Various Student Council members serve on more than 10 University committees.

The Association presents an array of events throughout the year, including the annual Banana Challenge, the Can/Am Hockey Game, Hootenanny, Harvestfest, Winter Formal, and chapel Faith at Work Week. As a department of TWUSA events, Ground Level presents concerts for the entertainment and enjoyment of Student Association members.

As well, the Student Association provides services to its members. These include barbecue rentals, video equipment rentals, discounted photocopying, faxing, and various party supplies. Student Council also sets aside monies for Student Association members in the Student Initiative Proposal Budget, which provides the opportunity for the funding of student initiatives as they are approved throughout the year by Student Council.

Student Council oversees and sponsors a variety of academic and social student clubs on campus. The Student Association welcomes all students to become involved in their student government. The Student Association presents an opportunity to glorify God by serving the campus community, being involved with the decisions of the University administration, and gaining incomparable leadership experience in the political and financial arenas. With the energy of a dedicated and talented team, the Student Council exists to help the Student Association and the University progress toward the fulfilment of their missions.
