Dining Services

All students, faculty, staff, and guests are welcome at all campus food outlets. The main dining room is located in the Reimer Student Centre. The Douglas Centre's food outlet is the Lower Caf, which provides snacks and lighter fare. The Cog is located in the Northwest Building and has a variety of coffees, teas, and snacks. All resident students living in dorm-style housing have access to the Reimer Student Centre Dining Room, Lower Caf, and The Cog through their meal plan or cash. Commuters and those not living in dorm-style housing may purchase meal plan value through Enrolment Services or pay cash.

Meal Plan

The Meal Plan is accessed conveniently through the student ID card. The Meal Plan is the board portion of the semester room and board fee for living on campus. The ID card is activated with the predetermined value at the beginning of each academic semester and can be used at all dining facilities within the University. Every time the ID card is used, the choice value is deducted from the total semester value in the individual's food account. The entire value amount must be used during the semester of purchase, with roll-over privileges from the fall to spring semester, provided that dorm residency is continued. A statement of account transactions is supplied three times per semester.

Being on the room and board Meal Plan means eating "à la carte," offering students the opportunity to eat what they wish, when they wish, and where they want to eat on campus. The Canadian government has made a provision for the University to provide the Residence Meal Plan value free of Goods and Services Tax, which is a savings of six per cent on each transaction. Information Technology

Trinity Western University provides its community with a campus wireless network. The service is provided to all residents for a modest fee. (This fee is included in the resident housing package. Consult the student portal <https://students.twu.ca> for prices and information.) Students living on campus may also connect their personal computers via the University's wired network using a provided ethernet connection in each of the dorm rooms. All network connections, wired or wireless, access the University's 30 Mb internet feed. Students without a personal computer or for students who live off campus and do not bring a computer to campus can access the University's computer labs for tasks such as word processing, research, and checking email.

All students, upon arrival, are issued a username and password, or TWUpass, for access to student related technology offerings such as the student information portal (<https://students.twu.ca>), student email, access to the University computer labs, and other technology resources. Students are encouraged to keep their TWUpass information secure to ensure their personal information remains private. The use of the TWU network and its related services is regulated by an acceptable use policy located on the student portal.

The Information Technology Help Desk, located in the Mattson Centre, assists students with technology-related questions such as lost or forgotten passwords, loss of network connectivity, and technology service offerings. At present, the Information Technology Help Desk does not offer hardware or software repair services for student-owned computers. See the section below entitled "Personal Computer Troubles" for repair options.

Personal Computers in Residence Rooms

TWU students may bring any type of computer with any available operating system. However, the University recommends computers with Apple OS X 10.4, Microsoft Windows XP SP2, Microsoft Vista, or a recent release of any Linux distribution. It also recommends using a current productivity suite such as Microsoft Office 2003, Microsoft Office 2004 for OS X, Microsoft Office 2007, or OpenOffice 2.0 or greater. Also, current and updated Anti-Virus software is essential. To connect a computer in resident rooms, students must have a 10/100/1000baseT network card and provide an Ethernet RJ45 patch cable (minimum 6 ft.). These are available at any electronics store. For wireless service, students need an 802.11b adapter card.

Personal Computer Troubles

For resolving computer troubles, students can contact the help ministry called SHOUT. This student volunteer group can verify room connections and help with many computer issues. For more serious computer troubles, students may need to contact their computer manufacturer for support. NEU Drop-in Lab

Drop-in/Instructional Lab

This lab is equipped with 34 Pentium IV PCs running Windows XP Pro with Office 2003. The computers in this lab are available to all students for general assignments weekday afternoons. These computers also run other course-related software. For more information on software in this lab, speak to the lab supervisor.

NEU Instructional Computer Lab

This lab is equipped with 34 Pentium IV PCs running Windows XP Pro with Office 2003. These computers also run other course-related software. This lab is specifically used for instructor-guided classes/sessions.

Douglas Hall Learning Resource Centre

This lab is equipped with 5 Pentium IV PCs running Windows XP Pro with Office 2003. The function of this lab is to assist students in the preparation of papers. The facility is staffed by writing assistants who are available by appointment.

Geography Computer Lab

Access to this lab is restricted to Geography majors and minors who are working on Geography projects that require specific software only available

in this lab. This lab is equipped with 10 Pentium IV PCs running Windows XP with Office 2003.

Graduate Computing Lab in Psychology

Access to this lab is restricted to graduate students in Psychology to do research and/or type papers. The lab is equipped with 6 Pentium IV PCs running Windows XP Pro with Office 2003 and SPSS.

Modern Languages Computer Lab

This lab is equipped with 24 Pentium IV PCs running Windows XP Pro with Office 2003. This lab is specifically used for instructor-guided classes/sessions in Modern Languages.

Multimedia Lab

The POD has 1 IBM and 8 Apple computers equipped with a full range of graphics, web, and multimedia production software and associated production equipment including 11 x 17" colour printer, 4000 DPI production scanner, audio equipment, and video decks. This lab is restricted to students in specific Professional Studies and Performing Arts courses. See lab supervisor for more information.

Senior Computing Lab

Access to this lab is restricted to third and fourth year Mathematics and Computing Science students. This lab is equipped with 10 Pentium IV PCs running Windows XP Pro with Office 2003 and 1 G5 Mac with Office 2004 running OSX 10.4. These computers are loaded with many programming languages and software to accommodate student projects and assignments.

Vernon Strombeck Education Computer Lab

Access to this lab is restricted to Education majors and minors. This lab is equipped with 8 Mac G5 computers running OSX 10.4 with Office 2004. In addition, this lab has Education specific software.

To reduce problems in receiving parcels from the U.S., parcels should be sent via the U.S. Postal Service to the Langley address. A Customs declaration (available at any U.S. post office) must be affixed to the parcel. Gifts that are \$60 (CDN) in value or less are duty and GST free.

Norma Marion Alloway Library

The Norma Marion Alloway Library plays a key role in students' educational experience. It serves as an extension of the classroom by providing resources and services for research projects, term papers, presentations, and personal growth.

The Library, providing nearly 39,000 square feet of floor space, is located near the centre of campus. It seats more than 350 students and houses a collection of more than 200,000 print volumes, 8,000 ebooks, 3000 videos and DVDs,

and 51,000 microform volume equivalents.

The Library provides a variety of resources, including books, electronic books, journals, documents, microforms, audio-visual materials, and a curriculum materials centre. University Archives and Special Collections, also housed in the Library, are available for research. Students and faculty also have electronic access to full text data bases, article indexes, reference sources, and catalogues of other libraries. To help students make more effective use of its collections, the Library provides the following facilities and services: research assistance, bibliographic instruction, interlibrary loans, 30 public computers, access to the Internet, electronic databases, listening/viewing stations, photocopiers, and individual/group study rooms.

COPPUL membership allows graduate and undergraduate students borrowing privileges at most Canadian university libraries. Other libraries in the Lower Mainland such as Regent College, Columbia Bible College, and Summit Pacific College have reciprocal borrowing privileges. The Norma Marion Alloway Library is open to the public. Arrangements can be made for external borrowing privileges.

The University Archives are located on the upper level of the Norma Marion Alloway Library and online at <http://archives.twu.ca.8080/>. The mandate of the University Archives is to preserve and provide access to the unique institutional history of the University. To this end, the Archives acquires, organizes, and preserves archival materials which document the mission, characteristics, decisions, and activities of the TWU community. At present, the Archives' holdings consist of more than 100 metres of unpublished archival records, 20 metres of published materials, more than 20,000 photographs and slides, as well as video and audio cassettes and numerous artifacts.

The archivist also acquires materials of archival value accumulated by individuals and corporate bodies who have a significant relationship with the University. The Robert N. Thompson Fonds and Mel Smith Papers are two such collections.

All campus parking is by permit, daily dispenser tickets, or by short-term metered parking. Campus parking regulations are found in the General University Policies chapter of this Calendar and at www.twu.ca/parking and are enforced campus-wide 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days of the year. Resident and commuter students who bring vehicles onto campus are encouraged to purchase an "Academic Year Permit" (in effect from September to April). All parking lots on campus have been designated by campus signage to correspond with the "R" Resident permit, the "C" Commuter permit and the "S" staff/faculty permit. Summer permits, which are in effect from May through to

September, are available for students taking classes during the summer months. To purchase a permit, vehicle license plate details, make, model, and colour, must be accurately submitted or the permit will be invalid. The RCMP, in cooperation with Parking Services, enforces the BC Motor Vehicle Act on the TWU campus.

Each residence room is equipped with a telephone line that is activated for local calling upon arrival. Each roommate has a private voice mailbox which is associated with a shared telephone number. These numbers are assigned to the room, not to the individual. Telephone numbers and instructions for setting up voice mail are posted in each room and residents may make local calls and personalize their voice mail immediately upon arrival. Residents must provide their own analog

telephone set. We recommend regular corded phones to avoid interference with wireless networks in the building. The Housing Office wants to contribute to a living and learning environment that promotes individual growth and development, encourages the development of godly Christian leaders, and provides safe, secure, comfortable, and affordable housing for full-time students.

Most dormitory rooms house two students and are supplied with beds, mattresses, and other essential furnishings. No cooking equipment is allowed in the dormitory rooms. Students provide their own linens, towels, etc. Each residence building contains coin-operated laundry facilities.

Robson Hall provides selected third and fourth year full-time students with the option of living in a dorm-style environment, but with a community-style kitchen to prepare their own meals. The Fraser, Northwest, and Douglas Halls provide a variety of dormitory styles to suit the various needs and demands of full-time students. Selected third and fourth year students also have the opportunity to live in independent apartments. These apartments are located in several buildings on campus including Fraser, McMillan, and Northwest.

Housing Policies

Accepted full-time students will receive a Residence Application which must be completed and returned to the Admissions Office with the required applicable deposit to reserve housing accommodations. All applications for student housing should be made as soon as possible after acceptance to the University. Priority for housing is given to those who submit a housing application and deposit first.

All full-time students under 21 years of age, who have neither attained third year status (57 sem. hrs.) nor lived on campus for four semesters (not including Summer sessions) are required to live in residence unless they live with their parents or legal guardian. Students who, due to extenuating circumstances, desire to live off campus, but not with their parents, must appeal for special permission by submitting a written request to the Housing Appeals

Committee no later than June 1 for the fall semester and October 1 for the spring semester. Appeals are to be filed at the Housing Office.

Specified hours have been established for co-ed visitation. Additional residential housing details are included in the Student Handbook, which is provided to students upon arrival.

Trinity Western University Student Association

The Trinity Western University Student Association (TWUSA) is the official organization of the students at Trinity Western University. The association is comprised of every student enrolled in an undergraduate program who pays student fees. It is governed by the Student Council. Council is the representative voice of the association and is responsible for its daily operations and business.

The mission of TWUSA is to promote a maturing and active commitment to Jesus Christ among association members; to challenge one another spiritually, socially, and intellectually; to provide individuals with opportunities for involvement; and to impact positively the life of the University as well as the community at large.

Student Council is made up of seven executive members, 10 representatives, and eight appointed positions. TWUSA elects 15 members to the Student Council, 14 of whom are elected in early spring to take office in April. The 15th elected member, the Freshman Class Representative, is elected in September.

The Student Council Executive is composed of the President, Executive Vice-President, Vice-President of Finance, Vice-President of Student Relations, Vice-President of Academic Relations, Executive Director of Events, and Executive Assistant. Each member of the Executive is a department leader of non-Executive Council members.

The Executive Vice-President serves as chair of the Student Council business meetings, and the Executive Assistant is responsible for the minutes of all Student Council meetings. The Executive Director of Events is responsible for all TWUSA events. The 16 voting members on Student Council are the Executive, the Senior, Junior, Sophomore, and Freshman class representatives, and the six representatives from each of the faculties and schools: Humanities and Social Sciences, Natural and Applied Sciences, Professional Studies and Performing Arts, the School of Business, the School of Education, and the School of Human Kinetics.

The council includes eight positions appointed by the executive that play specific roles in the council's day-to-day operations: Associate Director of Communications, Associate Director of

Operations, Ground Level Coordinator, two Events Assistants, Associate Director of Services, Research Coordinator, and Website Developer. The Student Council Executive, along with the University administration, appoints the Editors-in-Chief of the *Mars' Hill* (student newspaper), *Pillar* (student yearbook), and *The Reel* (video yearbook).

New students are encouraged to run for Freshman Class Representative or to apply for one of the appointed positions that are intended for first year students. As well, the association has opportunities for involvement with its media departments (*Mars' Hill*, *Pillar*, and *The Reel*).

The council advocates for student concerns to the University administration, conducts surveys and hosts forums on current campus issues, and communicates information on administrative decisions to the student body. The President presents students' concerns to the University administration. Various Student Council members serve on more than 10 University committees.

The association presents an array of events throughout the year, including the annual Banana Challenge, the Can/Am Hockey Game, Hootenanny, Harvestfest, Winter Formal, and the series of Faith at Work Week chapels. As a department of TWUSA events, Ground Level presents concerts for the entertainment and enjoyment of TWUSA members.

As well, the student association provides services to its members that include barbecue rentals, discounted photocopying, faxing, and various party supplies. Student Council also sets aside monies for TWUSA members in the Student Initiative Proposal Budget, which provides the opportunity for financing student initiatives as they are approved throughout the year by Student Council.

Student Council oversees and sponsors a variety of academic and social student clubs on campus and welcomes all students to become involved in student government. TWUSA presents an opportunity to glorify God by serving the campus community, being involved with the decisions of the University administration, and gaining incomparable leadership experience in the political and financial arenas. With the energy of a dedicated and talented team, the Student Council exists to help TWUSA and the University progress toward the fulfilment of their mission.
