For specific directions on how to get to certain banks and for more options of banks in the Langley area, download **Google Maps** on your phone. You can wait for the 562 bus at the bus stop on campus across the street from the Robert G. Kuhn Centre beside the gym parking lot. There are two 562 buses, one to Langley Central and the other to Walnut Grove (opposite directions). Don't worry— the location will be displayed on the front of the bus alongside its number. If you need further help while taking transit, don't be afraid to ask for directions from the bus driver.

Setting up your bank account

Once you have selected a bank, the next step is to set up your Canadian bank account. To open a Canadian bank account:

- 1. Go to the bank you've chosen
- 2. Tell them that you would like to open up a Canadian bank account
- 3. Bring two pieces of identification (ID)

LAUNDRY TIP!

If you plan to live on campus in Langley, take note that laundry costs: \$1.25 for the washer and \$1.25 for the dryer. You will need \$2.50 to do laundry. That is two loonies and two quarters!

PREPARING AND ARRIVING IN CANADA

FINDING YOUR WAY THROUGH THE AIRPORT

Vancouver International Airport (YVR) is where most international students arrive in British Columbia. Before leaving home, it could be helpful to have a copy of terminal maps to help you find your way through the Vancouver airport. Click on <u>Terminal Maps</u> to download some maps!

For further help, follow the instructions below to know where to go once you arrive at Vancouver International Airport.



STEP 1: When you arrive at the Vancouver International Airport, you will need to follow the "All Passengers" signs to get to a Canada Border Service Agency (CBSA) Officer.





STEP 2: You will need to line up at the port of entry where you will prepare to see a CBSA officer. Make sure to have your documents ready as this will speed up your entry into Canada. The CBSA officer will ask for your travel documents and your Customs Declaration Card. Please do not hesitate to ask for an interpreter if you need an English translation.





STEP 3: Next, you must get your study permit from Canada Immigration. This is where you will give the officer your study permit and approval letter.

STEP 4: After you have accomplished this, you will go and pick up your luggage at the Baggage Claim section.



STEP 5: That is it! You have made it. Now get in line to leave the Vancouver Airport. Check out the different transportation system contacts (see below) that can take you from the airport to Trinity Western University.

TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM CONTACTS

Taxi: 604-272-1111 or 604-533-3333. When you step outside the airport, there are usually taxi services available.

Uber: Plan your transit to TWU ahead of time with uber.

Bus and Skytrain: If you are planning on taking the bus or Skytrain to TWU, take a look at <u>Translink</u> for bus schedules and maps.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS BY CBSA OFFICERS

The list below shows a sample of important questions that you may be asked by a CBSA officer when you enter Canada. It is essential that you answer ALL questions truthfully.

1. "How are you doing?"

TIP: Do not feel nervous with this question. It is asked to simply help you feel comfortable, so do not feel like you have to respond in a formal way.

"What are you planning to do in Canada?"
 TIP: Study.

3. "Where are you planning to stay in Canada?" Or "Where are you going?"

TIP: Share with the officer your accommodation (e.g., Living on campus at Trinity Western University). In your response, it is helpful to include your future address and a short explanation of the town or city you will be staying at.

4. "Have you ever been to Canada previously?" TIP: Answer truthfully with a "yes" or "no".

5. "Why did you choose this college/university in Canada?" TIP: Share with the officer your program of study and a few things about Trinity Western University (e.g., I wanted to attend a faith-based academic institution or TWU offered a program I am interested in etc.).

6. "Are you planning to work in Canada?" TIP: Answer truthfully. Next, let's look at items to pack that will help you prepare for your time in Canada. The list below outlines important documents to bring with you and recommendations for your personal packing list.

Before leaving home, it is important that you have these important documents with you at ALL times during travel. Do not put them in your checked luggage.

A. List of Important Documents:

- 1. Valid Passport
- 2. Visitor Visa or Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA), if applicable to your case.
- 3. Study Permit approval letter. This is also known as a letter of introduction.
- 4. TWU final acceptance letter.
- Proof that you have enough money to support yourself while staying in Canada (e.g., bank statement, credit card statements).
- 6. Proof of medical insurance from home country or institution.
- Official academic transcripts, detailed course descriptions and class syllabuses in English or official translations into English from any institution you have previously attended, if applicable to your case.
- 8. TOEFL or IELTS score, if applicable.

To help ease the process, make a list of any important documents that are being sent separately before or after your arrival to Canada.

It is also wise to review the <u>Border Reminder Checklist</u> by the Canada Border Services Agency to ensure that you do not miss anything.

While important documents are necessary and important to bring with you, these personal items can also support your transition to Canada.

B. List of Personal Items:

- 1. Appropriate clothing for fall, winter, spring, and summer seasons
- 2. Something that helps you feel close to home (e.g., pictures, music, books)
- 3. Dictionary of the English language and your language
- 4. Telephone card
- 5. Plug adapter for Canada, if needed
- 6. Small amount of Canadian cash, traveller's cheques and credit card
- 7. International driver's license and/or valid driver's license, if applicable
- 8. Immunization and medical records
- 9. Bedsheets, pillow, and pillowcase (keep in mind that TWU only provides a bed frame with a mattress—you can purchase bedding here at the bookstore, in the city, or you can send some from home)
- 10. List of items that will arrive after you get to Canada if you are sending anything separately

How should you split your luggage? The list below suggests which items you should put in your carry-on and which items should go into your checked luggage.

C. Carry-on Luggage:

- 1. Travel documents
- 2. Address with postal code of where you will be staying once you arrive in Canada
- 3. List of emergency contacts in Canada or your home country
- 4. Booking confirmation for flights or other travel arrangements
- 5. Money (Canadian dollars, debit card, credit card)
- 6. Electronics (cell phone, camera, laptop, chargers)
- Toiletries in appropriate sizes and packages (see Liquids, aerosols, and gels).
- 8. Power adaptor
- 9. Prescription medications in original containers (see <u>Travelling with medication</u>)
- 10. One set of clothes to change during your travel For more information on restrictions on carry-on luggage and how to pack for an easier time travelling through checkpoints, check out <u>The Government of</u> Canada Carry-on Baggage Policy.

D. Checked Luggage:

- All clothes and shoes needed for fall, summer, winter, and spring. The temperature in B.C. usually ranges from 0°C to 35°C.
- 2. Waterproof clothing for rain as it rains a lot here! (e.g., rain jacket, umbrella, rubber boots)
- 3. School backpack
- 4. School supplies, pens, pencils, and notebooks
- 5. Non-prescription medications, such as cold and stomach medications
- 6. Any household items you would like to bring with you, including toiletries

It is essential that you check the weight of your luggage before travelling as most airlines have weight restrictions.

To ensure that you are packing well, it is important to know that there are items that are prohibited (not allowed) in Canada. You should know these regulations well before arriving in Canada to ensure a smooth and stress-free journey. TIP!

It is wise and helpful to have a digital copy of all your important documents before travelling, including the bio data page of your passport. This is the page of your passport with your photo on it.

Schools Programs and Activities

RECREATION



Not far from Downtown Langley, this mall has over 150 stores and services. Shop for clothing, shoes, sporting goods, mobile phones, or anything else you need—and grab a bite at the food court.

COMPASS CARD

To travel using British Columbia's public transportation system, <u>you need to</u> <u>have a Compass Card</u>. This allows you to use most buses, trains and ferries. To buy a Compass Card, **you can <u>order one online or purchase in-person</u> at a London Drugs store.**

Sodexo

TWU also offers meal plans for all students on campus. If you are planning to live in dorms, it is mandatory that you register for a meal plan on campus. To see the options and costs for a TWU meal plan, visit the TWU Sodexo Meal Plan.

Having a TWU meal plan allows you to access food at the Main Cafe, the Bookstore Cafe, and ROOTED—a plant-based cafe on campus. Flex dollars also come with your meal plan, which allows you to spend money at these designated food locations on campus.

BUS STATION AND BUS LINE

If you are planning on using public transit as your main mode of transportation, bus number 562 will be the bus you will take often. You can wait for this bus at the bus stop on campus across from the Robert G. Kuhn centre.

It is important to note that there are two 562 buses. One goes to Walnut Grove and the other one goes to Langley Centre. Take the 562 Langley Ctr bus if you are going to:

- The Banks
- Main Grocery Stores
- Bus Connections at Langley Centre

Take the 562 Walnut Grove bus if you are going to:

- Fort Langley
- Lee's Market, Save-On-Foods, or Shoppers Drug Mart

To check for specific bus times and directions, we recommend that you download Google Maps as an app on your phone.



Compass Card

Taking the bus in the Lower Mainland can be cheaper and more efficient if you purchase a Compass Card. A Compass Card is a reusable bus pass that you can top up monthly, yearly, or with just enough money for how often you plan to use the bus. The perk of having a Compass Card is that it can be used all over the Lower Mainland on buses, skytrains, and sea buses. This may be a benefit if you are planning on exploring Vancouver and other cities near the Langley area. To find more information about purchasing and topping up your Compass Card, check out <u>Translink Compass Card</u>.

When you have purchased your Compass Card, you are all set to go on your trips! To pay for your ride, simply tap your Compass Card at the payment area on the bus (usually by the doors near the bus driver). One tap when you get on the ride is all you need.



Other Modes of Transportation

Sometimes getting around by bus is not always the most convenient. There are other modes of transportation that may be more suitable for you. Here are some suggestions.

Uber-Uber is a car ride service that operates 24/7. All you have to do is download their app and create an account to request a ride. You can also request a ride immediately or schedule a ride for later.

Bike-The Trinity Western University Student Association (TWUSA) has bikes available for you to rent for free! If this interests you, drop by the TWUSA lounge located in the Douglas Centre to ask for bike rental availability.

Carpooling-Carpooling happens all the time at TWU, and it is when many people who are travelling to the same destination decide to go together in one car rather than each person driving there themselves. If you are travelling to the same destination as another TWU student, do not be afraid to ask to carpool with them!

Invest in your own car-If you would like to drive, drop by ICBC for information and the process of how to legally drive in British Columbia. You can check online for more information at ICBC.

The closest ICBC from Trinity Western University is a 30-minute bus ride from TWU.

MEDICAL INSURANCE Q&A

Who is medical insurance for?

Everybody living in British Columbia longer than 6 months requires insurance.

Do I need medical insurance as an international student?

Every international student in Canada is required to have medical insurance. This is called <u>MSP (Medical Services Plan)</u>. All students also need to get interim (temporary) medical insurance before they receive their MSP.

Why is medical insurance important?

If you get sick, injured, or need surgery and go to the hospital or clinic, you will need medical insurance so that you can get reimbursement for medical services, which can be very expensive.

What is interim medical insurance?

Temporary medical insurance covers many of your medical expenses during your first three months in Canada. We recommend you apply for it before you arrive in Canada.

What is MSP and how does it work?

MSP is mandatory for all residents living in B.C. longer than 6 months, so it is important that you register right away.

MSP will cover many of your basic medical expenses, but it does not begin until three months aftert the date you applied. This is why temporary medical insurance is important. On your first day in Canada, you should apply for MSP. This can be done online.

ADDITIONAL TIPS For International Students

Somebody called, emailed, or texted me saying that I'm in trouble, I owe money, I'm involved in a crime... etc.

In Canada, thousands of international students are targeted each year with something called a "scam." These scams are ways for bad organizations to steal students' identity and their money. They will contact students pretending to be a government worker, police officer, embassy or the bank and very often ask for personal information or money.

I have questions about study permits, work permits or immigration.

We understand that many international students have questions about study permits, post graduate work permits (PGWP), and working while taking classes. Please refer to Canada's Immigration and Citizenship page for basic information. If you need to get connected with a licensed immigration advisor for further questions, please submit a <u>helpdesk request</u>.

How can I make friends, get involved and build community?

We would recommend participating in our Intercultural Programs, visiting a collegium (for commuters) or attending regular campus events. Dorms and apartments will also have lots of fun activities if you live on campus. You can talk to your resident assistant about what events are upcoming.

I'm feeling anxious, homesick or disconnected.

We understand that coming to a new country can be a difficult transition. You may experience culture shock, anxiety, tiredness, homesickness or disconnection from others. However, we are here to support you during these experiences. We recommend going to our Wellness Centre which has lots of great resources for international students. You can also reach our Intercultural Programs team that have TWU student leaders from all around the world who are dedicated to supporting and serving international students.

Who should I speak to if I'm not doing well in my classes?

Your first step should be to speak directly to your professor. In Canada, it is very common and normal for students to connect with their professors one on one to ask about how they can improve. You can also visit the <u>LearningCommons</u> or speak to your academic advisor. If you don't know who that is, contact the advising office.

I have questions about my degree and/or which courses to take.

If you are a new incoming student, you can reach out to your admissions counsellor to assist you with course registration. If you are a current student, please contact your academic advisor. To find out who that is, you can email the advising office.

If you need a place to study, relax, cook, or hang out, visit the Global Lounge— a beautiful space for all students to enjoy. Grab a coffee, meet a friend, and enjoy this space designated just for you. This is an open space for all students to use.
