- NOTE: Students combining a Biblical Studies, ICRS, or CHRC minor/concentration with a Biblical Studies, ICRS, or CHRC major cannot double count the same course(s) in the major and minor/concentration. For example, RELS 101 and 102 are required in every RELS major, minor and concentration. Students must choose whether the semester hours for these courses will be applied to the major or the minor/concentration. If applied to the major, then the same amount of semester hours must be replaced (via courses taken) in the minor/concentration. Thus, every major must complete 42 s.h., every concentration 30 s.h., and every minor must complete 24 s.h.
- NOTE: In order to be eligible for graduation you must complete an Application for Graduation via the Student Portal and submit a completed checklist to the Office of the Registrar by April 30 of the year prior to your completion (there is no fee to apply for graduation). Once your complete application has been received, a degree audit will be completed for you. This audit will confirm which courses are still outstanding in order for you to complete your degree.
