- Program completion status

Eligibility

To be eligible to apply, you must

- be a Canadian citizen, a permanent resident of Canada or a Protected Person under subsection 95(2) of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act (Canada), as of the application deadline
- have completed no more than 24 months of full-time study in your doctoral program by December 31 of the calendar year of application if previously enrolled in a graduate program
- have completed no more than 36 months of full-time study in your joint program by December 31 of the calendar year of application if enrolled in a joint program; such as, MD/PhD, MA/PhD
 - if you fall into this category, you have access to the 36-month window whether or not you were previously enrolled in a master's program
- have completed **no more than 36 months** of full-time study in your doctoral program by December 31 of the calendar year of application if enrolled directly from a bachelor's to a PhD program (without having completed or enrolled in another graduate program)
 - $\circ\,$ direct-entry applicants must be enrolled in their doctoral program at the time of application

Note: To maximize your potential period of funding, you may be eligible to apply to the <u>CGS M program</u> for your first year of doctoral funding. You are responsible for choosing the type of award for which you apply. See *Other restrictions* below for more information.

Number of months

Eligibility for CGS D is based on the number of months of full-time study, including summer months, toward the degree for which you are requesting funding by **December 31 of the calendar year of application**. Two terms of part-time study count as one term of full-time study.



Note: The agencies count all studies toward the doctoral degree for which funding is requested, whether or not they were completed at the degree-granting institution.

Agency Specific Doctoral Awards

- Each agency has its own doctoral awards for meritorious applications
- Applicants submit only one application to be considered for both the CGS-D and the agency specific awards
- Eligibility requirements may differ for agency specific awards
- Tenable within Canada or abroad



SSHRC – Social Sciences & Humanities

The intended outcome of the research must primarily be to add to our understanding and knowledge of individuals, groups, and societies - what we think, how we live and how we interact with each other and the world around us.

NSERC – Natural Science & Engineering

The intended objectives of the research must primarily be to advance knowledge in one or more of the natural science or engineering disciplines.

CIHR – Health

The intended outcomes of the research must primarily improve or have an impact on health and/or produce more effective health services and products and/or strengthen the Canadian health care system.




CGS-D Application Flowchart

Indigenous Student Researchers

- Institutions may recommend applications from self-identified Indigenous student researchers to the doctoral awards competition beyond their application quota.
- Self-identified Indigenous student researchers must agree to their personal information being used for this purpose by making the appropriate selection in the application form.



Black Student Researchers

- The Government of Canada has increased the amount of funding available specifically to Black student researchers.
- Each agency has a limited number of additional CGS D awards reserved for this initiative.
- Self-identified Black student researchers must agree to their personal information being used for this purpose by making the appropriate selection in the application form.



Special Circumstances

- Applicants can outline any special circumstances that have affected their performance or productivity.
 - For example, delays in disseminating research results due to health problems, family responsibilities, parental leave, disabilities, trauma and loss or other applicable circumstances.
- Applicants may want to consider including disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, if applicable.
 - o For example, lab access, equipment delays, family responsibilities, etc.
 - Should include an explanation about what was done to adjust or compensate in response to these impacts.
- Each agency includes a section for Special Circumstances in their application process.
 - SSHRC submit a 1 page "Allowable Inclusions" document
 - o NSERC in the application form, in the section entitled "Special Circumstances"
 - CIHR in the Canadian Common CV (CCV), in the section entitled "Employment", subsection entitled "Leaves of Absence and Impact on Research"





Writing a Research Proposal

- A proposal needs to communicate effectively to <u>all</u> readers.
- An **interdisciplinary** group of selection committee members will be evaluating your application. Some committee members will speak a different disciplinary "language", so your proposal needs to be written in lay terms.
- Ensure that your proposal provides a clear outline of your research, including, for example, the research question(s), context, objectives, methodology, and significance, as well as expected contributions to advancing knowledge.
- Consult with your supervisor when writing your proposal. The Office of Graduate Studies cannot assist applicants with writing their research proposals.

If submitting electronic transcripts, applicants are responsible for contacting the respective university to obtain the legend. Pages from an Academic Calendar or equivalent are not accepted.

TRINITY WESTERN UNIVERSITY TRANSCRIPT KEY

Trinity Western University was established in 1962 and is characted by the Province of British Columbia to grant degrees. In 1969, it operated under the "Trinity Junior College Ast" of the Province of British Columbia. An amendment to this act in 1971 provided for the name change to Trinity Western College. "The Trinity Western College Act" of 1977 authorized the four-year university program. The Charter amended by the Legislature of British Columbia in 1979 authorized the granting of baccalaureate degrees. In 1985, the Provincial Legislature authorized a name change to Trinity Western University. Trinity Western University is a member of Universities Canada.
