Eligibility

- Citizenship status
- Program completion status

Eligibility

To be eligible to apply, you must

- be a Canadian citizen, a permanent resident of Canada or a Protected Person under subsection 95(2) of the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act* (Canada), as of the application deadline
- have completed **no more than 24 months** of full-time study in your doctoral program by December 31 of the calendar year of application if previously enrolled in a graduate program
- have completed **no more than 36 months** of full-time study in your joint program by December 31 of the calendar year of application if enrolled in a joint program; such as, MD/PhD, MA/PhD
 - if you fall into this category, you have access to the 36-month window whether or not you were previously enrolled in a master's program
- have completed **no more than 36 months** of full-time study in your doctoral program by December 31 of the calendar year of application if enrolled directly from a bachelor's to a PhD program (without having completed or enrolled in another graduate program)
 - direct-entry applicants must be enrolled in their doctoral program at the time of application

Note: To maximize your potential period of funding, you may be eligible to apply to the [CGS M program](#) for your first year of doctoral funding. You are responsible for choosing the type of award for which you apply. See *Other restrictions* below for more information.

Number of months

Eligibility for CGS D is based on the number of months of full-time study, including summer months, toward the degree for which you are requesting funding by **December 31 of the calendar year of application**. Two terms of part-time study count as one term of full-time study.

Note: The agencies count all studies toward the doctoral degree for which funding is requested, whether or not they were completed at the degree-granting institution.



Agency Specific Doctoral Awards

- Each agency has its own doctoral awards for meritorious applications
- Applicants submit only one application to be considered for both the CGS-D and the agency specific awards
- Eligibility requirements may differ for agency specific awards
- Tenable within Canada or abroad



SSHRC — Social Sciences & Humanities

The intended outcome of the research must primarily be to add to our understanding and knowledge of individuals, groups, and societies - what we think, how we live and how we interact with each other and the world around us.

NSERC — Natural Science & Engineering

The intended objectives of the research must primarily be to advance knowledge in one or more of the natural science or engineering disciplines.

CIHR — Health

The intended outcomes of the research must primarily improve or have an impact on health and/or produce more effective health services and products and/or strengthen the Canadian health care system.




CGS-D Application Flowchart

Application Requirements

A complete application package includes the following sections:

- CCV
- Doctoral Award application in Research Portal
 - Application Profile
 - Program Information (where the institution with a quota is identified)
 - Areas of Study
 - Diversity Considerations in Research Design Module (not visible to the SLO)
 - Research Proposal (max. two pages)
 - Bibliography / Citations (max. five pages)
 - Transcripts & official letters confirming part-time status or interruptions
 - Allowable Inclusion (max. one page if applicable)
 - Research Contributions, Relevant Experience and Activities (max. two pages)
 - Justification pages for supplements and joint initiatives (only if applicable)
 - Referees — 2 letters of appraisal



Allowable Inclusions

Applicants may submit a one-page document outlining special circumstances that could have affected the applicant's:

- research
- professional career
- record of academic or research achievement
- or completion of degrees



Indigenous Student Researchers

- Institutions may submit meritorious applications from self-identified Indigenous applicants beyond their application quota.
- Self-identified Indigenous applicants must agree to their personal information being used for this purpose by making the appropriate selection in the application form.



Writing a Research Proposal

- A proposal needs to communicate effectively to all readers.
- An **interdisciplinary** group of selection committee members will be evaluating your application. Some committee members will speak a different disciplinary “language”, so your proposal needs to be written in lay terms.
- Ensure that your proposal provides a clear outline of your research, including, for example, the research question(s), context, objectives, methodology, and significance, as well as expected contributions to advancing knowledge.
- Consult with your supervisor when writing your proposal. The Office of Graduate Studies cannot assist applicants with writing their research proposals.



Official Transcripts

*Up-to-date official transcripts of the applicant's complete post-secondary academic record, including all undergraduate and graduate studies, completed or ongoing.

Up-to-date official transcripts are defined as (1) transcripts issued by the Registrar's Office and (2) dated or issued in the fall session of the year of the application (if currently registered) or after the last term completed (if not currently registered).

- Opening the envelope to scan the transcript will not render it unofficial for application purposes.
- Uploaded transcript text must be horizontal.
- Original copies of any uploaded transcripts must be retained as they may be requested by the agency for verification purposes at any point in the process.

*Applicants who are or were registered at an institution that does not provide transcripts must submit, in lieu of a transcript, a letter bearing the official institution seal/stamp or a letter signed by the Dean of Graduate Studies confirming the applicant's program of study, the applicant's registration status, the date of initial registration, the degree obtained or sought and the fact that the institution does not provide transcripts.



Transcript Key

One copy of the transcript key/legend must be included for each institution for which a transcript is submitted.

Applications without transcript keys will not meet eligibility criteria.

TRINITY WESTERN UNIVERSITY TRANSCRIPT KEY

Trinity Western University was established in 1962 and is chartered by the Province of British Columbia to grant degrees. In 1969, it operated under the "Trinity Junior College Act" of the Province of British Columbia. An amendment to this act in 1972 provided for the name change to Trinity Western College. "The Trinity Western College Act" of 1977 authorized the four-year university program. The Charter amended by the Legislature of British Columbia in 1979 authorized the granting of baccalaureate degrees. In 1985, the Provincial Legislature authorized a name change to Trinity Western University. Trinity Western University is a member of Universities Canada.
