SCAMS TARGETING INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Protect Yourself From Losing Thousands of Dollars

MANY STUDENTS GET SCAMMED

Many international students around the world are scammed, including twu students.

Their identity is stolen or they lose thousands of dollars.

SCAMMERS MAKE YOU KEEP IT A SECRET

They tell you that you're in trouble and that you cannot speak to anyone about your situation including your family, friends, the bank or others.

This is a lie!

WHAT SCAMMERS ASK FOR

Scammers will OFTEN ask you:

- To send money to "fix" your situation
- For personal information such as...
 - Bank Account information
 - Birth date and name
 - Social insurance number (SIN)
 - Adress

WHO SCAMMERS PRETEND TO BE

You may receive a call, e-mail or text from a scammer posing as:

- A government official
- Somebody from canada revenue agency (CRA)
- A police officer
- A bank teller
- An Embassy

WHAT THEY MAY SAY:

Many of these scammers will say that:

- You owe outstanding fees from an immigration application or tax audity
- You have received money
- Your social insurance number (SIN) has been blocked or compromised
- There is a warrant for your arrest
- You may lose your visa and be deported
- You were involved unknowingly in an international crime
- Somebody has a copy of your passport and is involved in a crime

IMPORTANT THINGS TO KNOW

- Don't always trust caller ID because scammers can change what name appears
- The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) never requests payment by e-transfer, online currency, bitcoin or pre-paid credit cards
- The CRA does not communicate by text
- Government officials or the police will never threaten or demand money
- Banks do not ask for personal information as they already have it on their system

WHAT TO DO NEXT?

If you are suspicious that a call or message is from a scammer:

- Do not give out any personal information or send money
- do not click on any links or files in the message (if it's a text or e-mail)
- Search their website or phone number and find out if they are legitimate
